Links to PAST learning- It was during this period that Britain became a major world power with an Empire the covered the globe.

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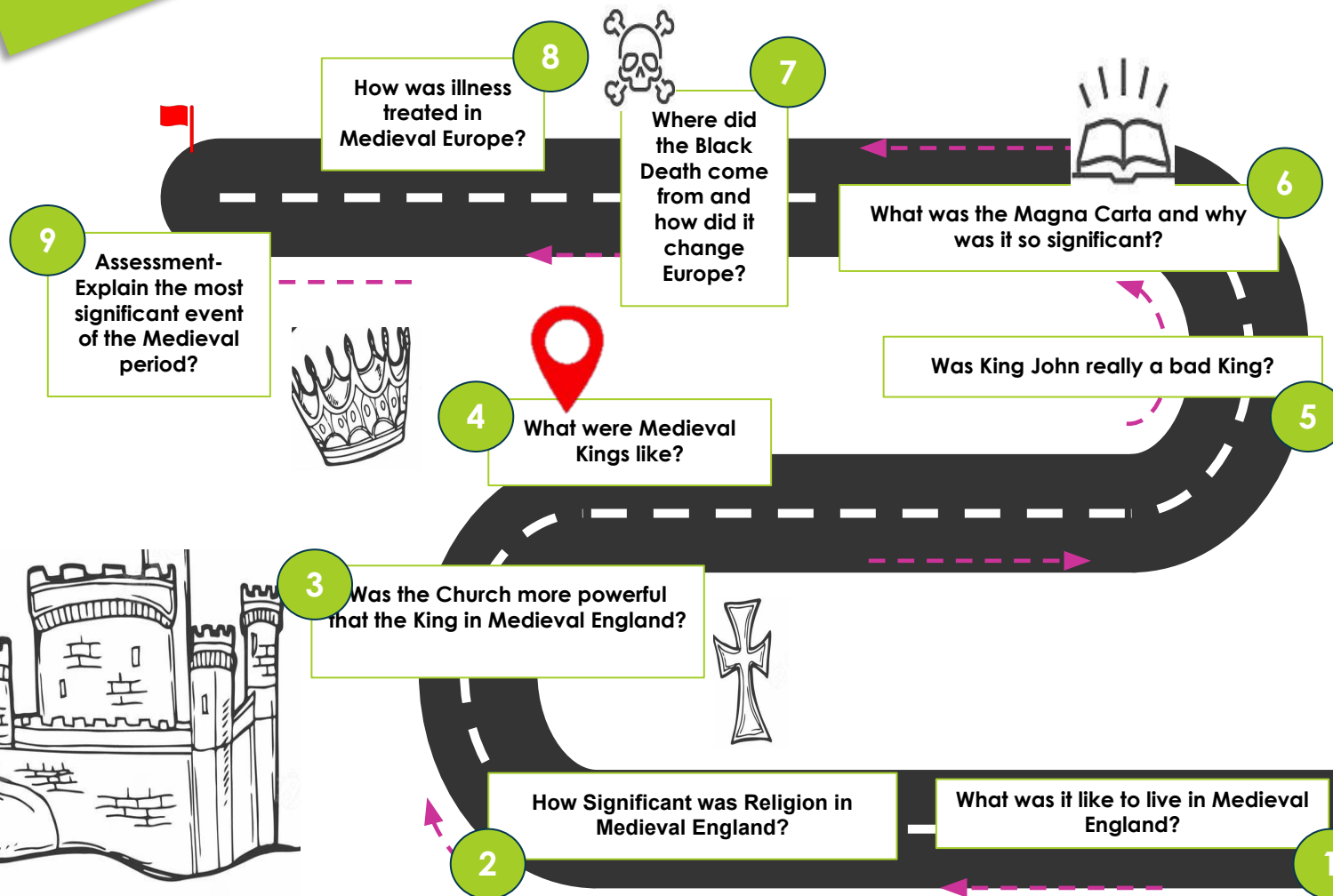

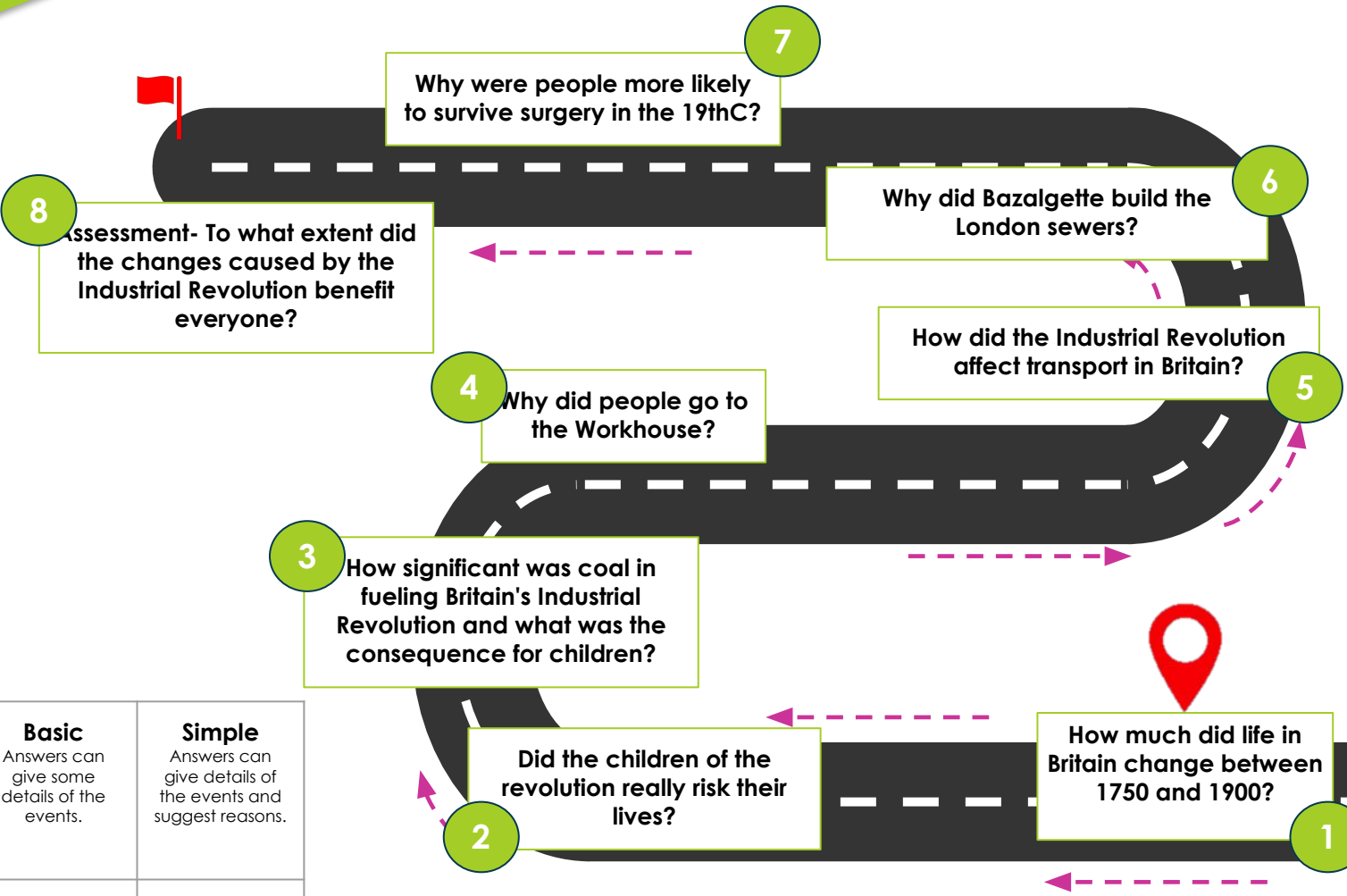
